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Course content

A level Film Studies combines the study of existing film with the opportunity to create your own media texts. We'll be assessing your grasp of the theory by asking you to put the theory into practice through film making tasks. The course comprises the following components:

Varieties of film and film making – 35%

This component of the course will involve studying six British and Hollywood feature length films from the 1930s through to the present day. The types of films studied may include: *Vertigo* (Hitchcock), *Apocalypse Now* (Coppola), *Inception* (Nolan), *Winter's Bone* (Granik), *This is England* (Meadows).

Global film making perspectives – 35%

This component focuses on five feature length films which include: global film, documentary film, silent cinema and experimental film. Films studied may include: *House of Flying Daggers* (Yimou), *Mustang* (Erguven) and *Pulp Fiction* (Tarantino), *Stories We Tell* (Polley).

Production – non-exam assessment – 30%

For the NEA, you'll be researching, planning and producing a short film of between 4 and 5 minutes. You'll also evaluate this work assessing: narrative structure, cinematic influences and impact on the audience.

Most people watch hundreds of films during their lives, but they don't always consider the messages, values and representations that are conveyed through film. Nor do many really consider the process of film production and the way that relatively simple techniques – camerawork, sound, editing and performance – can create something that has the power to make us laugh, cry, feel angry, impassioned. We love teaching film studies because we enjoy helping students understand these aspects of film; we also enjoy seeing them try these techniques for themselves as they go out and produce their own short movies.
