Many Year 13s will be 18 by the 2024 General Election - It is paramount that we register to vote.

Here's why:

Accountability and Civic Responsibility: By registering to vote, we hold our elected officials accountable for their decisions and actions. It is important that we express our opinions of our current government. This participation in the electoral process empowers us to shape the policies that will impact our future.

Not registering is abstaining from the democratic system, whereas choosing not to vote on the night is abstaining due to the available candidates. For young people it is very important that we are registered so that we at least have the option of going to vote.

Although there may not be a candidate who represents your beliefs, you should consider who would be elected if you choose not to vote. This "Best bad option" is useful if there is a candidate or party that you don't want to be elected as it takes a percentage of the vote away from them.

Remember, registering to vote is more than a civic duty; it's an opportunity to actively shape the future. It's a chance to stand up for our beliefs, advocate for positive change, and hold our leaders accountable.

Registration is open now. Every voice matters. Don't miss this opportunity.
