English Language and Literature Combined (AQA)

This is a brilliant course because it explores the power of words. In the course, you'll enjoy considering the way words can be manipulated to convey different messages and emotions. You'll also get to explore the technicalities of language – the etymology of words and the linguistic devices that can be used to lend power to an argument. The course gives students the freedom to pursue their own interests as they complete their textual investigation. Our students say:

This course covers the following topics: Telling Stories (40%)

This part of the course will focus on storytelling and what stories tell us about society. We'll spend time debating controversial issues that arise from our reading and we'll discuss the techniques writers use to convey their ideas. During this part of the course, we'll study the following texts:

- AQA Anthology a wide range of text types with an emphasis on non-fiction and • non-literary material.
- Prose The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood.
- AQA Poetic Voices Anthology focusing on a range of poems by Carol Ann Duffy. • **Exploring Conflict (40%)**

This part of the course focuses on how language can be used to construct conflict between characters. We'll debate the themes and issues that arise from the texts and explore the techniques used by writers. In this section of the course, we'll help you develop your creative writing skills by asking you to write in the style of a particular author; you'll also be expected to analyse your creative writing as if it were written by a professional author. During this part of the course, we'll be studying the following texts:

- A modern prose text e.g. The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald
- A play e.g. A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams.

Making Connections (20%) – non-exam assessment

The non-exam assessment (NEA) is a piece coursework that offers students the opportunity to investigate texts of their choice. You'll receive support to choose an appropriate theme for their work together with fiction and non-fiction texts to study. The NEA allows students creative freedom to follow their own interests and culminates in a 2500 word investigation.
