



# British values statement

We are committed to serving our community and recognising the multi-cultural, multi-faith and ever-changing nature of the United Kingdom. We also understand the vital role the academy plays in ensuring that groups or individuals within the academy are not subjected to intimidation or radicalisation by those wishing to unduly, or illegally, influence them.

We follow equality guidance which endeavours to ensure there will be no discrimination against any individual or group, regardless of faith, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, political or financial status, or similar. We are dedicated to preparing students for their adult life beyond the formal, examined curriculum and ensuring that it promotes and reinforces British values to all our students.

Our school is committed to promoting British Values and the holistic development of students through Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) education. This policy outlines how we integrate these principles into the curriculum and school life to foster a supportive and inclusive environment. We use the language of Common values, rather than specifically British Values as a way of communicating that these values can be shared across communities rather than limited to observance by British people. This allows us to add our own values seamlessly, so see Common Values as an extension rather than a replacement.

Encourage student participation in school decision-making processes

# The rule of law

Teach the importance of Laws and rules in school and society

Develop an understanding of the justice system and its role in maintaining order

Work with Police and other bodies to encourage familiarity and active engagement

# **Individual liberty**

Support students in making well-informed choices in a safe and supportive environment Promote the freedom to hold and express opinions and belief, even if we don't agree Teach active citizenship and rights-based legislation

# Mutual respect

Foster an environment of respect for others, regardless of differences Educate students about different cultures, religions and lifestyles Learn to disagree agreeably Promoting CNS Ethos (4P's for example)

# Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs

OAT religious studies curriculum is implemented in full which encourages respect and knowledge of all different faiths and beliefs

Students are encouraged to share their views

All learners are seen as being equal regardless of their faiths and beliefs and students are taught to recognise and respect difference

Students are given the ability to understand their place in a culturally diverse community via the curriculum, tutor time, assemblies, external providers and trips
